Preparing to Write the RN and RPN National Exam

Introduction

This fact sheet was developed to help internationally educated applicants prepare to write the Canadian Registered Nurse Examination (CRNE) and the Canadian Practical Nurse Registration Examination (CPNRE).

The College of Nurses of Ontario (the College) recommends that applicants begin their preparation by evaluating their learning needs, and upgrading their skills and knowledge where needed. An essential component of this evaluation is learning about how nursing is practised in Ontario, and about the social and cultural issues that are involved in nursing. A solid understanding in these areas will better prepare the applicant to write the exam.

How to Prepare

The following is a list of suggestions and strategies for preparing to write the CRNE and the CPNRE. Applicants may choose to use all or some of these suggestions, or may decide to develop their own preparation strategies.

- Take an English or French language course that emphasizes both written and oral skills. The national examination is only available in English or French, and consists of multiple-choice questions only.
- Review the College's *Compendium of Standards*. The Compendium is available at www.cno.org.
- Enrol in an examination preparation course to review content and techniques for responding to multiple-choice questions.
- Enrol in an approved nursing bridging/upgrading program to become familiar with the practice of nursing in Ontario. Look for a program offered at government-approved Colleges of Applied Arts and Technology (CAAT). These courses contain both classroom and practical experience, and are an excellent way to learn about current nursing practice in the Ontario health care system. The instructor can help identify areas where you need to enhance your nursing knowledge and skills. Contact the

school or Community College you want to attend for details about the length of the program.

- Purchase the examination study guide from the Canadian Nurses Association (CNA) for the CRNE and Assessment Strategies Incorporated for the CPNRE. These are the organizations that create and score the registration examinations. The study guide includes sample questions, answers and explanations, a survey to identify strengths and weaknesses, study tips and strategies for writing the exam. The guide is available in school bookstores, or can be ordered by calling 613 237-2133, toll-free in Canada at 1 800 385-5881, or by faxing 613 237-3520.
- RN applicants can also visit CNA's Web site at www.cna-aiic.ca and take their LeaRN CRNE readiness test. This test uses former CRNE test questions and gives overall results on how prepared individuals are to write the CRNE. RPN applicants can gauge their readiness with the CPNRE Predictor Test at www.ASITest.ca. (Note: there is a charge for both of these tests.)
- Review content from your nursing educational program. Focus on health and wellness promotion and illness prevention across the lifespan. Pay particular attention to issues involving the nurse-client relationship, curative/supportive care, rehabilitation and professional practice.
- Become a member of a nursing peer support group. These groups can provide suggestions for preparing to write the exam.

The CARE Program

You can also become a member of the CARE (Creating Access to Regulated Employment) Centre. The Centre can help you prepare for the registration exams and to practise nursing safely and confidently in Ontario.

As a participant of the CARE program you will receive the following:

- guidance, information and support on how to

- pursue your nursing goals in Canada;
- an Exam Readiness Assessment that will help you learn more about how to best prepare for the exam and focus your studying;
- exam strategies and tips for success;
- an evaluation and review of your knowledge and skills;
- nursing-specific communication skills and vocabulary;
- first-hand look at how nursing is practised in Ontario through volunteer employer placements;
- small group tutoring;
- job search and employment preparation assistance; and
- opportunities to establish professional networks, contacts and support.
