Practical Nurse (PN) Entry-to-Practice Exam

In September 2019, CNO's Council approved the Regulatory Exam – Practical Nurse (REx-PN) as the registration exam for PN applicants. The exam is currently in development and will be available in January 2022.

The exam uses a Computerized Adaptive Testing (CAT) format. CAT determines the level of difficulty of the question it generates based on how well a writer responds to the preceding question. This "item response theory" allows each person who writes the exam to have a different set of questions each time the exam is written. There is no risk that the writer can memorize the exam's content, as the software system generates new sets of questions for every rewrite. Regardless of the number of writes, a writer will only be successful on the REx-PN if they are able to show they have the knowledge, skill and judgment to pass.

As a result, on December 5, 2019, Council approved unlimited writes for the REx-PN considering the new exam's enhanced format and security features. Council also approved December 31st, 2021 as the end date for the current

Nursing Education Assessment – United Kingdom (UK) Specialty-Prepared Registered Nurses (RNs)

Changes in international nursing regulation led CNO to review its approach to the assessment of specialty-prepared UK RNs. The review was conducted to review a potentially unfair practice that limited UK nurses' access to the nursing profession.

As a result of the review, in June 2019, CNO revised its policy to allow UK specialty-prepared RNs to apply, move through the education assessment process, and become eligible for registration if they completed additional education focused on ages of the lifespan and areas of practice where minimal previous educational preparation was evident. For example, the UK RN prepared in the Child Specialty will be required to complete additional education in Nursing of Adults (Medical and Surgical) and Geriatrics, along with any other education that is required to address identified competency gaps. Once completed, this applicant could meet the nursing education requirement, attempt the RN registration exam (NCLEX-RN) and potentially become eligible for registration as an RN.

In Ontario, RNs are prepared as generalists. They are educated to practice across a range of health situations and illnesses; with people of all genders; across all ages of the lifespan; in a variety of practice settings; and with various clients, including individuals, families, groups, communities and populations. In contrast, the UK RNs are educated and registered in one of four specialties – Adult, Child, Disabilities and Mental Health. If an RN wishes to register in more than one specialty in the UK, they must complete additional education that is focused on that specialty area.

In the past, when UK specialty-prepared RNs applied to CNO, it was our practice not to register them because they were not prepared as generalist RNs. For example, RNs trained in the Child Specialty tend not to have substantial education in the medical and surgical care of adults or older adults (Geriatrics). Gaps in these areas could pose a potential public protection risk. Thus, UK-prepared RNs were advised not to apply, or they would be refused registration.

This change to the new process mitigates the risk to the public while providing UK specialty-prepared RNs with new options for satisfying CNO's entry-to-practice requirements.

Changes to Exam Administration Process for Canadian Nurse Practitioner Exam (CNPE)

In July 2019, the CNPE Administration Process changed for NP (Primary Health Care) applicants. The exam provider, Yardstick Assessment Strategies Inc., became responsible for scheduling exams and processing exam fees. Prior to this change, CNO was responsible for the exam administration process. The specific changes are as follows:

- 1. A paperless exam registration process: Once exam eligibility is granted by CNO, the applicant is sent a message in their CNO online account and must submit their exam registration through CNO's online portal. CNO will then send their information to the exam provider. This replaces a paper exam process where payment was submitted to CNO on an exam form and processed by CNO staff resources.
- 2. A simplified/streamlined exam registration process: The exam provider contacts the applicant and invites them to create an account where they can choose their test centre location, schedule an examination date, and pay any examination fees. Before this change, applicants paid an exam fee to CNO and a scheduling fee to the exam provider. As well, applicants were limited to choosing only the city in which they wrote the exam, not their preferred exam centre.
- ii. Describe the impact of the improvements / changes on applicants.

Practical Nurse (PN) Entry-to-Practice Exam

As of January 2022, PN applicants:

- a. will have unlimited opportunities to attempt the new REx-PN;
- b. can attempt the REx-PN up to six times per year after waiting 60 days between each attempt, as compared to the four exam windows currently offered per year for the CPNRE; and
- c. will not have to complete a new PN program to become eligible for further attempts on the REx-PN exam.

Nursing Education – United Kingdom (UK) Specialty-Prepared Registered Nurses (RNs)

UK specialty-prepared RNs will have the opportunity to apply and become eligible for registration in Ontario, once they complete the required additional education. This change improves this group of applicants' access to the profession and will assist these applicants in meeting the entry-to-practice requirements for nurses. With the additional education, UK specialty-prepared RNs will be better prepared to attempt the RN registration exam, the NCLEX-RN. This exam was developed based on generalist preparation as an RN.

Changes to Exam Administration Process for Canadian Nurse Practitioner Exam (CNPE)

These changes to the CPNE exam administration process:

- a. allow applicants to deal directly with the exam provider, instead of CNO, to pay fees and schedule or reschedule exams:
- b. enhance timeframes and streamline the applicant's experience via an online process; and
- c. result in decreased costs for the applicant with the fee reduced from \$1100.00 (\$1243.00 with HST) to \$768.75 (\$868.69 with HST).

iii. Describe the impact of the improvements / changes on your organization.

Practical Nurse (PN) Entry-to-Practice Exam

The new format of the REx-PN enhances public protection. It will ensure that applicants have the knowledge, skill and judgment to practice safely as an entry-level practical nurse. The exam's new format eliminates an applicant's ability to memorize standard banks of questions.

Nursing Education – United Kingdom (UK) Specialty-Prepared Registered Nurses (RNs)

By requiring UK specialty-prepared RNs to complete additional education to address identified gaps, CNO is ensuring their education is equivalent to that of a generalist prepared graduate of an Ontario university baccalaureate degree nursing program. This new approach balances fairness to the applicant with public protection.

Changes to Exam Administration Process for Canadian Nurse Practitioner Exam (CNPE)

The exam provider is now fully responsible for administering the CNPE. CNO is no longer responsible for ensuring that operational resources are available to collect fees and schedule/reschedule the CNPE.

Fee decrease for the Canadian Nurse Practitioner Examination (CNPE)

Changes to the exam administration process for the CNPE as reported above in b) resulted in a fee decrease from \$1100.00 (\$1243.00) to \$768.75 (\$868.69). Applicants pay both the exam fee \$768.75 (\$868.69) and a seating fee \$105.00 (\$118.65) to the exam provider, Yardstick Assessment Strategies Inc. For an exam that is written in Ontario, the NP applicant's fee decreased by \$255.66.

Fee decrease for the Canadian Nurse Practitioner Examination (CNPE)

Nurse Practitioner – Primary Health Care applicants pay a lower fee for writing the CNPE.

Fee decrease for the Canadian Nurse Practitioner Examination (CNPE)

The change reflects the decreased administrative costs incurred by CNO. CNO no longer requires staff resources to manage the process associated with exam payment or exam scheduling/rescheduling.

Practical Nurse (PN) Entry-to-Practice Exam

- 1. Approval of the new Practical Nurse registration exam (REx-PN) and unlimited writes on this exam beginning in January 2022. See b) above.
- 2. Effective December 5, 2019, CNO changed its operational processes to align with Council's decision to allow

applicants an unlimited number of writes on the REx-PN. As a result, RPN applicants, who fail the current PN registration exam (CPNRE) three times and are no longer eligible to attempt the CPNRE, will be able to attempt the REx-PNexam when it is implemented in January 2022. Their application will remain open until that time. This process replaces a process whereby RPN applicants, who fail the CPNRE three times, would only have further attempts on the CPNRE if the Registration Committee either:

- a. annulled one or more attempts on the CPNRE where the applicant provided evidence of extenuating circumstances; or
- b. refused the application and the applicant completed a new PN program.

Practical Nurse (PN) Entry-to-Practice Exam

- 1. See Practical Nurse (PN) Entry-to-Practice Exam, section (b) ii above.
- 2. As of December 5, 2019, Council's decision to move to an unlimited number of writes on the REx-PN had the following impacts on current and new RPN applicants who failed the CPNRE three times:
 - a. they will have the option to keep their application open, instead of potentially refused by the Registration Committee, and become eligible for unlimited attempts on the REx-PN in January 2022. Though the application will remain open until January 2022, these applicants will have to update any of the requirements that may expire during this time, including evidence of practice, jurisprudence, and language proficiency;
 - b. they will not be required to complete a new program to become eligible for further attempts on the REx-PN; and
 - c. they will not have to incur the time, effort, and expense to reapply.
- 3. Former applicants who failed the CPNRE three times and were refused registration by the Registration Committee prior to Council's December 5, 2019 decision, will have to reapply to CNO. While these applicants will be required to spend additional time, effort and expense re-applying to CNO, including applying via the National Nursing Assessment Service for internationally educated nurses, they will not be required to complete a new PN program to become eligible to write the REx-PN. They will be assessed according to the processes and requirements in place at the time of their new application.

Practical Nurse (PN) Entry-to-Practice Exam

- 1. See Practical Nurse (PN) Entry-to-Practice Exam, section (c) iii above.
- 2. As of the date of Council's decision on December 5, 2019, CNO has:
 - changed its correspondence to RPN applicants who have failed the CPNRE three times to advise them about their options; and
 - introduced administrative processes to monitor and track RPN applicants who fail the CPNRE three times and choose to leave their application open. These processes will allow CNO to identify those applicants who could be eligible to attempt the new REx-PN exam as of January 2022.

With applicants choosing to keep their application open, CNO anticipates there will be a decrease in the number of matters reviewed by the

Registration Committee relating to three-time fails on the CPNRE.

- 4. In March 2019, CNO's website detailed a new option for former RN and RPN members of the General Class who wish to return to practice the Supervised Practice Experience. CNO designed this option for nurses who register in the Non-Practising Class and have not practiced nursing between three to five years. Nurses who pursue this option must work with a supervising nurse within a sponsoring organization to complete a supervised practice experience required to meet the evidence of practice requirement for registration needed to register in the General Class.
